Out there at one point it must have been blowing 30 – Starling said, Bill Byrd says "well in here there was a puff that was 35. The forecast was for the wind to

increase during the day. We had a good turnout of sailors eager to go out. The PRO, made a statement that safety was a serious concern and that anyone with less than expert level experience should consider crewing for someone who was comfortable with the conditions.



There was a large fleet of Scots, 6 at least but only 2 went out. And both retired before the start of the first race, as did Ken Warren in his Lightning. I was sailing with Starling Gunn and Mark Evens on Mark's boat. It was really easy to get it up on a plane. It was a day for catamarans and lasers. Phil Andrews and John Fragakis in Lasers were having a great time. Isotopes were all 2 up. Tom Armstrong and crew were very fast

in his Hobie 18. The catamarans were all screaming across lake, hulls flying, water spraying on race committee, 200 feet away.

If you capsize or fall in with a self-inflating life vest it costs about \$25 to get a new CO2 cartridge and trigger tablet. So when an experienced sailor like Starling starts looking for a non-inflatable life vest the wind definitely is up!









There was a great social with snacks and delicious Mexican soup made by Gloria.

Sunday's race was Mother's Day. With the holiday and family commitments there was a very low turnout of both RC and sailors, and it looked like races would be cancelled. Next year we will consider changing the May schedule to avoid this. Since the three Isotopes were rigged and the breeze was blowing beautifully we decided to have some unofficial "fun races". Bob Darby and Russel Dorrell took out one scat boat to set up a simple course with a starting line and a windward mark. With no flags or horns, Joleen and I did the start sequence using a whistle while sailing Joleen's Isotope. It is challenging to run a start sequence while also trying to sail! It was my first experience as crew on an Isotope and it was a lot of fun. We de-rigged the boats and had a nice lunch on the deck at Hams'.

It has been pointed out to me, the hull of our Flying Scot looked rather blotchy. It appeared to come and go, but nothing seemed to affect it. I spent a lot of time reviewing the forums, and listening to what other people have tried. There were 2 that were suggested to me. One was a cleaner called Marykates On Off. The ingredients in this product are available in other name brands as well. The other suggestion was buffing the boat. My main thought was that even though it looked nasty it wasn't hurting the speed of the boat. That buffing/sanding/soft scrub were all some level of abrasive, maybe the drop of water on the mountain, but eventually wearing away the gel coat. The cleaner had 3 types of acid listed. (Hydrochloric acid, Phosphoric acid & Oxalic acid, dihydrate) This was the main sticking point on this product, that and the warnings on wearing gloves, eye protection and

not getting it on your galvanized trailer....

The deciding moment came when we had our larger cruising boat pulled out, and they immediately put a product similar to the On Off and it instantly dissolved away the red stains on that boat. After using it on the Scot - the differences can be seen in these photos. The total time invested was less than an hour.





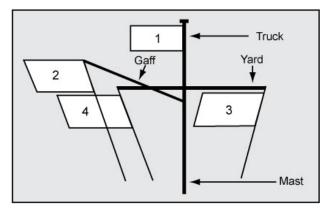
I put on gloves, had the hose ready and put a small amount in a plastic cup. I brushed it on with a natural fiber brush and hosed it off. (and rinsed the trailer a LOT) The gel form allowed the cleaner to go on and stay put, until it was rinsed off.

Open House - May 1st.

The marina had an open house, the rangers had a tent selling hotdogs. LTYC representatives, David Duff and George Bageant set up a table and flew some of the various nautical flags. Just in case you get the opportunity to fly the US Ensign, our America Flag, the

instructions for the proper placement of the flag is here: The position on the Gaff being out front represents a place of honor.



Display in Maritime Setting

For the most part, the provisions of the Flag Code are manifest in the traditions and customs for the display of the U.S. Ensign (flag) by seamen. The following provisions are made for the display of the flag on a mast located on yacht club grounds. (*Chapman Piloting: Seamanship and Small Boat Handling*, American Book-Stratford Press, Inc., New York, NY)

3. Mast with a Yard and Gaff:

- U.S. Ensign (flag) is flown at the gaff (#2).
- Club burgee (flag) is flown at the truck (#1).
- Flags at **#3** and **#4** vary depending on the activity at the club.

It is display **#3** which causes the most confusion. This puts the club burgee in a higher position physically, but not above that of the U.S. Ensign (flag) symbolically. By the normal Flag Code provisions, this would seem to be an incorrect display. **The tradition of the seas, however, is to hold the gaff as the position of honor; thus, the intent of this tradition and display is to give proper respect to the flag.**

Where a yard is involved, rules provide that when a foreign ensign is displayed, the U.S. Ensign (flag) is flown at #3; the foreign ensign at #4; the club burgee at #1; and other flags at #2.

The gaff extends aft (to the rear), and a mast on yacht club grounds is faced seaward. Therefore the gaff will (or should) be directed toward the land. The observation point then becomes a point somewhere on the sea side of the mast. This then makes the placement of the U.S. Ensign (flag) in regard to the foreign ensign conform to Flag Code provisions.

Adopt a boat program

Don't forget that if you want information on fiberglass boat repair, and to assist with restoring any of the Capri's, send Starling an email. When he isn't of down at the coast somewhere, he will tutor people on fiberglass repair.

Saleboats for Sail -

1981 Isotope - \$2500 with sails and a galvanized trailer. Crossbar, dolphin striker, and trampoline have been replaced and an extension added to the righting bar.
