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A brief history of the founding of the LTYC High School Sailing Team

Although the idea for a local high school sailing team had sparked long before, the summer of 2017 was when the very first steps were taken to start a team at Lake Townsend. The idea was originally proposed by former commodore Allan Taylor and my brother, club member Luke Hayes; and my father and I quickly hopped aboard as well. Stephanie Taylor was also involved. The remainder of that summer was spent planning and attempting to organize the inaugural season of the first high school sailing team in the Triad. In December of 2017 Allan and Mark presented the idea to the LTYC Board of Directors. Both the board and the city agreed to support us and allowed us to use the club SCAT boats and Tanzers and the city gave us permission to use the Capris. Thus the High School Sailing Team had become a reality! Luke and Lanie Walsh, Allan's niece, were our first captains.

The team's first interest meeting was held on March 8th of 2018 and the first practice on March 22nd. There were 23 different middle school and high school students who sailed that first season; however, I was unable to sail. I had recently broken my back in a lacrosse game and was unable to compete during our first season, but that did not stop me from riding in the coach boat and helping out in any and every way I could. The team trained hard for the first few months, practicing several days a week, rain or shine, wind or calm. In May of 2018 we had our first interclub regatta with Research Triangle Park's high school team. The regatta was sailed in C420's, boats our team had not had access to train in, and the day of the regatta proved to be very shifty winds and light rain. Regardless of this, Luke and his crew, Nino Criscuolo came out in second place overall.

By Fall of 2018 I had been cleared to sail in time for our team's second season. We continued to train on the city and club boats. We were also a much younger group because a large portion of our racers from the season before had graduated high school the previous spring, leaving myself and many of my middle school and early high school friends making up the majority of the team. We trained hard though and were eager to advance, being pushed evermore by the addition of our new coach and former commodore, George Bageant. We had an impressive season despite our relatively green team, highlighted by our second interclub regatta at RTP, where myself and Jack McArthur (both middle schoolers at the time) finished in second place. The real turning point for our team however came in late December of 2018 when several of the parents of our team members banded together to purchase our very own C420s from Hampton Yacht Club in Hampton, Virginia. Dedicated parents of four different families drove up to Virginia to trailer these boats back down to Lake Townsend to loan to our team, and the city graciously allowed us spots to leave these boats at the lake. In 2021 two additional C420s were generously donated to the high school sailing team from Fishing Bay Yacht Club in Deltaville, Virginia.

The switch to C420s, the boats raced at official high school regattas, fueled our team's ambition even further. We continued to train diligently and improved significantly, as we continue to do today. Currently the team's roster hovers between 15 and 18 sailors, with a fleet made up of six C420s. We continue to race in two seasons a year with roughly four away regattas and seven club regattas a year. Due to our dedicated coaches and passionate sailors, we have grown to be a very successful team, finishing well among teams from around the Southeast and producing two South Atlantic Yacht Racing Association All-Star sailors last year. Our team would be nowhere today without the support of all of the dedicated sailors, parents, coaches, and club members. I would like to specifically thank Allan and Stephanie Taylor for getting us off the ground, long time coach George Bageant, our head coach and team organizer Mark Hayes, the Lake Townsend Yacht Club Board of Directors, and all of the amazing club members who have supported us in many ways. It truly means the world to us.

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As I enter my last year of high school sailing, I am hopeful and excited for the future of this team as I know it is being left in good hands. This year we will be transitioning to a new coaching staff as well as bringing up a new senior group of sailors who are ready and willing to continue to lead the team and hold it to a high standard. I will always be thankful for my time as a member of the Lake Townsend Yacht Club High School Sailing Team.





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How to Set Sheet Blocks for Maximum Sail Power

Where do your Genoa sheet blocks need to be positioned along the Genoa track? It all starts with a neutral block position. Find the neutral block position where the sheet will apply equal tension on the leech and foot. Follow these easy sailing tips.



The neutral or "starting" sheet block position will give you a starting point for other sheet lead block settings. This position will depend on the relationship between the foot and leech of your Genoa or headsail. You want the Genoa or jib sheet to exert equal amounts of tension along the foot and leech for a good overall shape in moderate sailing conditions.

Most cruising Genoas are 150%, so the leech will be about 50% longer than the foot. Thinner sails like a working jib will need the sheet blocks positioned farther forward to support the longer leech (more on this later).

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150% Genoa Neutral Block Position

Pick a day with little to no wind. No need to get underway, you can do this first part in your slip. Unfurl the Genoa or hank on one of your sails. Determine the mid-point of your sail luff. You could mark this with a small piece of removable tape or just estimate the midpoint of the luff by eye.

Bend down in line with the Genoa lead block on one side of the boat. Sight up the sheet to the mid-point of the luff.

Slide the block fore or aft to create an imaginary straight line from Find the neutral the lead block up the sheet through the clew and then to the position. This places equal mid-point of the luff (dotted line in the illustration to the right). Mark tension along the leech and the track position with tape or a marker.

foot of the sail.


Mark the same position on the track on the other side of the boat. Keep both blocks in this neutral position in moderate sailing winds.

Working Jib Neutral Block Position

Thinner sails have longer leeches relative to the foot, so they need more tension along the leech. Sight up the sail to a point about 60% to 70% above the tack. Move the working jib block to this location along the working jib track. Set the block on the opposite side working jib track to this same position. Mark the neutral block position for the working jib on both sides of the boat.

How to Test Sheet Block Position

Test your block positions once you go sailing. Get onto a close hauled course with all luff telltales streaming together. Head up at a slow pace and watch the telltales break (flutter). Do



If the top telltale breaks first, move the block forward (left illustration). If the bottom telltale breaks first, move the block back (right illustra-

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If the upper telltales break first, your blocks are too far aft. This places more tension on the foot than the leech. Move the blocks a hole or two toward the bow (Top=Toward). Repeat the test; adjust as necessary until all telltales break even at the same time.

If the lower telltales break first, your blocks are too far forward. This places more tension on the leech than the foot. Move the blocks a hole or two back (Bottom=Back). Repeat the test; adjust as necessary until all telltales break at the same time.
