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TELL TALES

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US Sailing Chubb Nationals


Team co-captain Logan Hayes finished 13th in the Singlehanded Class at U.S. Sailing's Chubb Junior National Championships, sailed August 8 through 12 in Lasers at Macatawa Bay Yacht Club in Macatawa, Michigan; against some of the very best junior sailors in the country. Logan qualified to compete by placing second at the Commonwealth of Virginia Junior Championships held earlier in the summer. Immediately after the Chubb, Logan flew to Maryland, where he won the Junior Laser Class at the Oxford Regatta, hosted by Tred Avon Yacht Club. The Oxford Regatta was the final Chesapeake Bay Yacht Racing Association Junior High Points regatta of the summer. Logan is provisionally in 2nd place in the series. Congratulations to Logan!

Your mainsail needs to be trimmed so that the air exits the leech with minimum turbulence. How can you use leech telltales along with a secret "over-trim" first step technique to trim your mainsail to perfection? Follow this easy sailing solution...



Have your sailmaker install three telltales along the leech of your mainsail (you can also do this yourself to save time and \$\$\$). These will be attached to the end of each batten pocket. You will need at least three telltales along the leech.

Leech telltales that droop or hide on the lee side of the leech indicate a stalled sail. Most often, this results from sheeting the main too hard. The leech does not have enough twist near the head. You lose forward drive, sail more sideways, and weather helm and heeling increase.

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So, how do you get your mainsail leech shaped for speed and power? Follow these five steps:

1. Sail onto a close reaching point of sail. Trim your sails to balance the boat to the point where it just about steers itself without a lot of help (do not use an autopilot; steer by hand). Pick a distant object ahead of the boat to use as a reference point. Go to the next step.

2. Stand or sit aft near the end of the boom. Sight up the leech of the mainsail. Concentrate on the uppermost telltale. Crank in on the mainsheet so that you overtrim the mainsail. You will see the top telltale stall first, followed by the middle and lower telltales (photo left).

3. Feel the weather helm increase as the sail stalls. Glance ahead at your reference point. Notice how your boat crabs to the side. The stalled mainsail has lost most of its lift. Side force has taken over. The keel has to fight to provide lift. Look at your speed instrument. Your boat has slowed down. Now, let's get things right.

4. Sight up the leech of your mainsail again as you slowly ease the mainsheet. You want to do this in increments so the leech telltales have time to react to your last trim. Continue to ease the sheet until all telltales are streaming (photo right).

5. Belay the mainsheet. Test the helm and check your speed instrument. Your wheel or tiller should be much lighter to the touch and your speed should increase in a dramatic way.

Trim your mainsail to keep your leech telltales streaming from top to bottom. You will be rewarded with a boat that's fun to sail and faster too!

If you read the High School Sailing Report (above) you know that they participated in the club races this month with 6 boats, and you know that it was rainy and cold.


We had good wind all day, but called it after 2 windward/leeward races because the race committee (including myself) was **cold and wet! LOL**
