Dear LTYC Members, Friends and Supporters,

As I see the many months of Covid finally recede into the past, I can feel the growing enjoyment of sailors and sailing supporters at LTYC events and activities both on and off the water. It's a good feeling.

As you know, it's been a very busy and productive year at LTYC. We can all be proud of the many individual volunteer contributions made by members and soon-to-be members that make our club successful.

And we can be proud of the accomplishments of the 2023 board members as they navigate a new relationship with the City Of Greensboro Parks and Recreation as well as the 66% increase in annual membership dues to appease the same.

Our relationship with the Parks & Recreation is getting better, albeit we continue to be frustrated with the glacial progress on getting the docks improved.

Dinghy racing has been great with good participation numbers, albeit we did have a few drifters. Our policy of sailing the weather rather than the forecast has been a success this year with a number of races proceeding in reasonable racing weather despite the dire weather forecast.

Many of you volunteered for race committee duty and we thank you for that since RC is essential to successful and safe racing.

Use of the club fleet of boats has increased tremendously with members and new members frequently taking boats out for a sail during the week as well during race days. And, along with use comes repair of the boats using club volunteer expertise.

Sailing education has been very successful under the watchful guidance of Ron Washburn, although we are straining the capacity of those who volunteer to take the lead in sailing lessons and we are straining the sustainability of the city's aging fleet of rental boats as illustrated by the many repairs needed to maintain a working fleet. If you can, please volunteer to lead a class or at least support a class. This is beginner sailing so you need not be an expert.

The High School Sailing Team and the Wake Forest University members and practice sessions have been a success. These are dependent upon a few key individuals to maintain these efforts. As such, there is a need for more volunteers to help ensure continued success of these programs.

Our web services have grown to include new wufoo payment processing to support our special events and special programs including Sailing Education, HSST and WFU. We even have LTYC Merchandise that you can purchase through the website.

And, of course, the quality of the monthly Tell-Tale newsletter has been excellent. The Tell-Tale is another area where we need new volunteers to help out.

This fall, LTYC held the 10th HOT (Halloween on the Townsend) Regatta, achieving a milestone of over \$40,000 in donations to Earlier.Org, the breast cancer awareness non-profit, over the past 10 years.

LTYC's mission is to provide access to and to promote the sport of dinghy sailing at reasonable cost and open to all and I think we are being successful in that mission this year.

In 2024, we will need your help and contributions of time to support all of the club's programs and grow membership using our newly appointed Director of Marketing.

This year's Change of Watch dinner will be held at the Bryan Park Pavilion on the 21st of January. We'll be awarding trophies for the 2023 racing series, installing new slate of officers, and enjoying each other's company. Mark your calendar now.

Richard Storer Trophy

Three LTYC sailors, led by AnnMarie Covington, finish in the top five while competing for the prestigious Richard Storer Trophy.

This is the first time a USA sailor has won this trophy which was inaugurated in 1978 to honor the top overall Wayfarer Class sailor in North America. AnnMarie was consistent by placing well in regattas with a high turnout of Wayfarers such as the Midwinters, Mayor's Cup, HOT and the Jim Cook Memorial Regatta at Catawba Yacht Club.

Second place was captured by Canadian David Pugh, a four time winner of this trophy. He was followed by Jim Heffernan who placed third in the standings and then one point behind was Uwe Heine in fourth.

For 2023, the results of twenty four regattas on both sides of the border were used to determine the best six events to be scored for each North American sailor.

Other LTYC Wayfarer skippers that cracked the top ten were, Richard Johnson sixth, Ali Kisbaugh seventh, and Andy Forman tenth.

Well done to all of these fine helms and the many crew members who made it all possible by traveling to distant venues while supporting our local events.





Saturday the 9th of December marked the second day of this year's Winter Series.

We got in 2 windward/leeward races in light winds of 4-5 knots, with 7 boats competing. Winds got much lighter by midafternoon so the last race was shortened to a single lap race and the day was cut short by the threat of thunderstorms.

As normal for this series, we sailed as a single handicapped fleet using the Portsmouth Handicap System.

First place for the day was taken in a Wayfarer by AnnMarie Covington with her crew Eric Hakala.

After the racing, we feasted on subs, tostitos with corn salsa, and cookies covered with marshmallow and chocolate.





Every time I read about another person lost over the side I have to think of the why. That's the major point. The "why" of it all. And then, of course, you might read that the harness failed, or the harness clip deformed, or the manufacturer blew it, or the boat was deficient, or a boat part came loose under load.

Now, I have a hard time imagining the blame game being aimed at objects or folks not even aboard. Seems to me that misses the "why" altogether. It's always our move, our blunder, our misstep, or our inattention to detail which leaNow, I have a hard time imagining the blame game being aimed at objects or folks not even aboard. Seems to me that misses the "why" altogether. It's always our move, our blunder, our misstep, or our inattention to detail which leads to accidents. And here's why ds to accidents. And here's why...



Maybe we tried to be a hero, or impress someone aboard, or impress ourselves with our salty prowess, or cut a corner, or do something we know was too high a risk, or not insist that the skipper slow the boat, change course. On and on.

You can lash yourself to a boat with a harness and string a spiderweb of netting around to make you feel more secure. But in the end, those are secondary products. What will you do first, before you or another member of your crew go forward to fix a fouled furling gear or change out the headsail?

Keep going fast through the water because you are involved in a race?

Let me get this straight...

This is not a life or death beach landing during wartime...

Nor is it a search and rescue mission to save people in peril...

It's a recreational race for a hunk of metal (trophy) and bragging rights.

If you, the skipper, are about to send the crew forward to the narrowest segment of the boat (the bow), and you are already carrying too much sail (often done when racing), what point of sail will better protect your crew on the foredeck?

Set the boom vang, ease the mainsheet, and fall off to a deep broad reach. This places the foredeck in a <u>mainsail wind shadow</u>. It flattens the deck, reduces heeling, and keeps the deck dryer. The headsail will be easy to lower and swap out because of the lighter apparent wind coming across the deck.

Note in the illustration, the boat falls off from a close hauled course to a deep broad reach. Once the crew has returned to the cockpit, the skipper sails back onto the close hauled course. Simple and effective. And, a heck of a lot easier on the sailing crew, don't you think?


So, you lose a few minutes of racing time (if you're on a race). Big deal. Would you rather lose minutes or lives? It ain't wartime and it ain't a rescue mission. Keep this in mind each time you push your personal envelope when sailing or cruising with one other person or an entire complement of crew. Skippers take responsibility for the outcome; always.




A few members have indicated that they have had problems with using Paypal Payments on the LTYC website. Let's try to demystify the process a little.

Frist first page you see at Paypal is simply to allow you to select either to pay from your Paypal account (assuming that you have one) or to "**Pay with Debit or Credit Card**". I expect that most will select that option .

To do so...

Simply click on the button I have designated with the red arrow.



You will then be presented with the page shown below.

This is where you enter your billing information. Note... the email address and phone number are to allow Paypal to send you a receipt via email and/or text message.

Debit/Credit card number, expiration date, CVV number and billing address should be self-explanatory. They are all required.

Then simply click on the "Pay now as guest" button.

DO NOT click the radio button that says "Save info and create your Paypal account" (unless that is what you want).
