



Steve Raper joined the club in 1986, just 8 years after the club was founded. For over 30 years, Steve's carrot top could be seen at nearly every single club event in his Flying Scot. Steve was a very competitive racer. Even so, Steve could always be found at the lake on a nice day taking new club members sailing. Steve introduced the idea of a first sail to Greensboro long before First Sail became a national sailing campaign. Steve assisted every year as a lead sailing instructor for our sailing classes.



Besides sharing his love of sailing with others day in and day out, Steve also shared one of his other major enjoyments with the Club. In doing so, Steve lead LTYC into other firsts as well. As an IT professional for the City of Greensboro, Steve used his technology expertise to setup an online database and membership report. Steve also set the Club up with state of the Art online event registration and payment years before the likes of Regatta Network. The Club website was rolled out in 1997 and was Steve's brain trust. In recognition of the value of the website to the club, the board created Website as a director position and Steve joined the board as Website director in 2004. Steve guided the board as the Club' defacto technology officer turned the position over to our current Vice Commodore, Mark Wilson in 2017. Can anyone remember Lake Townsend prior to its website?

Steve then passed on his sailing legacy when Steve gifted his precious pride and joy, "Baby", to a club member who shared Steve's passion for taking other sailing. Otto Afanador carries on Steve's legacy of taking others out in Steve's "Baby", just for sheer joy of sharing our love of sailing with others.

Steve gave so much to promoting sailing and communications. It is LTYC members like Steve Raper that has Lake Townsend Yacht Club known as a very friendly club.

We will miss our long time good friend Steve Raper who passed away early this year...

As computers came along to assist in offices and business Steve did computer work for the City of Greensboro. The Parks and Rec Department was lucky enough to have Steve on their team. As the City and Parks and Rec were persuaded to increase sail-boating activity on Lake Townsend, teaching sailing classes was thought to be a helpful and logical activity.

Steve helped the team computerize from mimeograph promotion materials sorted and mailed out by hand to web-site on-line sailing class promotions and on-line registrations and on-line payments. Steve was really helping us do things in a modern way!

When the on-line promotional flyer needed a telephone number for people to call asking questions, Steve just inserted his own office phone number and answered those calls. By that time Steve was teaching lots of sailing classes in his free time and on weekends, so Steve knew the answers to the questions.

Many times Steve would discuss "beginner classes" with people on the phone and persuade them to sign up and then call and remind them to show up. Steve often taught those beginner classes and then afterwards took those new sailors out for a sail on his boat.

We sort of thought of Steve as the "Front Door Of The Sailing Club."

After helping get sailing classes started Steve recognized the need for teachers and he quickly stepped in to help teach classes, lots of classes.

My wife, Sonja Hughes and I met Steve Raper at the 1996 Change of Watch dinner. Within a couple weeks we were on Lake Townsend sailing and racing. Steve loved sailing and teaching and encouraging new sailors. I crewed for Steve before buying a sailboat. He was disappointed we did not purchase a Flying Scot like his Scot "Baby". A computer programmer of the highest order, Steve created the Lake Townsend Yacht Club website and the Club's presence on the world Wide Web.

We have fond memories of sailing trips with Steve to Smith Mountain Lake where when not sailing, he would sing and play his guitar.

I am in the process of putting together instructions including a timeline of things that need to be done that will be very helpful, and I will help you with whatever you need.

The very first thing to be done is to get a PRO. Jerry Thompson has been PRO of HOT for 9 of the 10 years and you need to contact him early enough to get on his busy schedule. There are other options if Jerry is not available which will be included in the instructions.

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February "Snow Flake" Race... didn't happen

While we were all looking forward to a great day of racing...

The warmest temperatures of the week were forecast (almost 70° F) despite the overcast skies, and no rain was expected until the evening

Only 4 boats were registered to race that day, and winds were very light as we meandered out of the cove and headed for the starting area.









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Then, as we left the cove we caught the westerly winds at around 12 mph and it looked like it was going to be a great day on the lake but on the other side of the lake PRO AnnMarie Covington was getting a wind reading of 16 mph with gusts well over 20 in the starting area.

We weren't even half way to the committee boat when we felt it, too.

Due to the high winds, the racing was canceled and we turned around and headed back to port.and her Race Committee called off February's Snowflake racing because the average wind velocity grew to 16 mph with gusts of well over 20 just as the race committee was setting the course.

Learn To Sail Volunteers Needed

Don't all jump at once... but don't be bashful either.

Last year we put on 17 different events and positively impacted 66 different people, but to make all this happen, **volunteers are critical**. Both instructors and safety boat support staff are needed.

Besides the revenue this generates for Lake Townsend Yacht Club, these efforts go a long way toward promoting sailing and boating safety in our community.

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
How to Tie the Rigger's Hitch Sailing Knot

Learn this tough-as-nails super sailing knot you can use to lash a piece of gear to a rail, remove a jammed sheet from a winch, or tie off a safety line to go aloft. Grab a piece of line now and give it a 'tie'.



In past articles, I've recommended the Rolling Hitch when you need a no-nonsense knot that will hold in place and not slip or slide. Use the rolling hitch to tie off a fender or remove a jammed Genoa sheet from a winch. But, there are alternates to the original Rolling Hitch that can offer a better grip on super slick surfaces.

Now, you may come across boaters in the yacht club bar that may challenge you that their Rolling Hitch beats your Rolling Hitch. Sounds like something out of kindergarten, but, then again, fill a sailor with too many rum punches and watch out!

So, when you hear stuff like this, turn to one of the world's most respected compendiums of 'knot-tying' knowledge: Ashley's Book of Knots. Ashley's illustrates both versions of the rolling hitch. And, world-class rigging expert and author Brion Toss calls the alternate version the 'Rigger's Hitch' sailing knot. In honor of the late master rigger, I will use that name for this unique knot.

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Three Steps to Tie the Rigger's Hitch

Today's high-tech synthetic lines have slippery outer cores. The extreme example would be polypropylene--that bright colored ski-rope that floats. Ever tried to tie a knot into that stuff? It can be a study in frustration! Modern cored or braided lines might not be quite as slick, but they can come close.

If you use slick synthetics for your Genoa sheets and the sheet jams onto your winch, the Rigger's Hitch might be the perfect knot to use to remove the jam and get you sailing again. Grab one to two feet of line. Practice tying the 'Rigger's Hitch' with the steps and illustrations below.

- 1. Note how the hitch starts similar to the Clove Hitch (far left illustration). Pass the end of the line over the standing part in a direction AWAY FROM the intended load. Here, the load lies to the right. Hitch to the left. Go to the next step.
- 2. Grasp the standing part of the line with your non-dominant hand. Hold it in place. Make a second hitch adjacent to the first hitch (middle illustration). Tuck the end of the line beneath the second hitch (far right illustration).
- 3. Remove all slack to make the knot tight and compact. Do this BEFORE you place a load onto the knot. Ease the load onto the line. This will allow the hitches to squeeze and hold. For additional security, add two half-hitches beneath the knot.

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Use these sailing tips to help you choose the best sailing knot to make sailing or cruising safer. Pass along knot tying tips like these to your sailing crew or partner to help them become more confident sailors on the waters of the world.
