Do You Know This “Run to Close Hauled” Sailing Secret?

Imagine that you are cruising along the coast on a lazy downwind passage. You are sailing in a light 5-knot southwesterly breeze with the wind on the quarter. The wind slowly increases to 15 knots throughout the day, but you hardly notice .

With the boat level and the crew relaxed and content, what could be better? Near the end of the day, the wind shifts abruptly. You'll need to head up to a close-hauled course. You change course with full sail and the boat heels hard over! So, what happened ?

When sailing downwind the apparent wind was relatively light. That's because the boat travels in the same direction as the wind. For example, if your boat travels at 6 knots downwind, and the true wind is blowing at 15 knots, the apparent wind your boat "feels" will be 9 knots.

As your boat turns upwind, the apparent wind increases to almost 20 knots on a close-hauled course! That's because the closer you are to the true wind, the higher the apparent wind speed becomes and the more your boat will heel.

More heeling means less efficient sailing. Weather helm increases and you lose power, speed, and drive. Look to windward. If you see whitecaps, flags streaming, or sailboats heeled over--reef your mainsail and Genoa before you head upwind.


Basic Race Management Seminars




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ON THE SAME TACK: PROPER COURSE

RRS Rule 17

Last month we discussed the critical definition of Proper Course. Now for a look at RRS 17.





At position 1 Blue is Keep Clear and Yellow is Right of Way, Rule 12.

At position 2 Blue is Right of Way, Rule 11, and Yellow is Keep Clear. However, since Blue acquired the Right of Way from Clear Astern and within two hull lengths (beam to beam) she is limited by Rule 17 in that she may not sail above her proper course. This is an excellent example of a Right of Way boat being restricted by another rule, in this case Rule 17.

At position 1 Blue is Right of Way and Yellow is Keep Clear, Rule 12.

At position 2 Blue is Right of Way and Yellow is Keep Clear, Rule 11. Rule 17 does not turn on as the windward boat, Yellow, established the overlap from Clear Astern. Blue may luff Yellow in an effort to protect her wind





Blue "tacks into" an overlap with Yellow.

At position 1 Blue is Keep Clear and Yellow is Right of Way, Rule 10.

At position 2 Blue is Right of Way and Yellow is Keep Clear, Rule 11. Note that Blue must initially give Yellow room to Keep Clear, Rule 15. Finally, Rule 17 does not turn on as Blue did not create the overlap with Yellow from Clear Astern.

Therefore, if it makes tactical sense, Blue may luff Yellow.

Next month we will continue to explore the nuances of Rule 17.

Blue Finish Flags

Race Signals for 2021-2024 include a new race signal - the Blue flag: "The staff displaying this flag is one end of the finishing line." Race committee flags are also blue. Several incidents have been reported in which competitors thought a race committee vessel displaying a blue race committee flag was one end of the finishing line.

The solution is cheap and effective. Intensity Sails (not a sponsor as *The Beat* has no sponsors) sells large yellow race committee flags at around \$15 a pop. The yellow race committee flags effectively eliminate the possibility of sailors mistaking a mark vessel for one end of the finish line.

The Old Brown Dog Regatta is held the first weekend of November at Catawba Yacht Club on Lake Wylie near Charlotte, NC. It is a one-design event for MC Scows and Wayfarers, who compete separately on the same course. This year it was held on November 6 & 7, 2021.

On Saturday, the Wayfarers and the MC Scows sailed from the protected docks of Catawba Yacht club into heavy wind. Before the first gun went off for the first race, the wind picked up even more, with blasting gusts. The MC Scows headed to shore, with the Wayfarers following close behind. No races were run on Saturday.

Saturday night brought the much anticipated karaoke and sing along. This year it was held outdoors with a campfire due to Covid. We all enjoyed singing our favorites, with Jim Higgins providing the music and words on a screen. The "Three Tenors of LTYC" (Uwe Heine, Phil Leonard and Andy Forman) made their debut singing Sweet Caroline, with everyone joining in on the chorus. Annette Grefe, complete with beard, played the ukulele and shared her childhood German song about men with beards. Great times!

On Sunday, the wind appeared to be much calmer. I switched out my reefing bedsheet type sail for my more competitive racing sail around 8AM, even though Jim Heffernan advised that once the sun broke through the cloud cover, the wind would return to nearly the same as the previous day. Of course, Jim was correct. By the time the first gun sounded for the first race at 9AM, the wind was almost as strong as Saturday. The gusts were more manageable than on Saturday. I had a good start and proceeded up the port side of the course. However, I went too far. This caused me to attempt to enter the layline on port with a parade of fast moving boats to dodge. I chose to tack away and go above the mark to avoid collisions. My third place rounding turned into sixth place. Otherwise, I sailed well and confidently without a reef in the heavy air, which was an achievement for me.

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The Wayfarers rounded the first mark one right after the next, but on the downwind leg, both Marie-Lyne and Pete Thorn capsized. Their Mark IV boats quickly turtled. RC, with the help of Jim Cook and crew, Mike Taylor, and Andy Forman, spent much time righting them. Jim and Mike sailed to shore, docked the Wayfarer and returned to assist the capsized boats with a motor boat. Andy sailed over to Pete's boat and traded places with Sid Hale. Sid skippered the Catawba Yacht Club Wayfarer with David DeMiranda while Andy assisted RC in helping Pete right his boat. When it became apparent that no more races would be held that day, the rest of the fleet returned to shore.

The 2021 OBD was decided on the basis of one race.

Awards were given for most beautiful boat and boat name: Marie-Lyne, and greatest number of almost and full capsizes: Pete, and for most original OBD Minstrel: Annette.

As usual, it was an extremely wonderful weekend. A great reason to buy a Wayfarer; just so you can participate in the OBD!

Beach Launching Update



"Beach launching for multihulls has returned to Lake Townsend. We saw a Hobie out just this past weekend and we hope to see more Weta's, isotopes and hobbies. The only restriction still in place is to not set up and take down on the launch ramp but do it in the parking lot or on the adjacent 10 feet of grass along the beach front. The idea is to not impede others." - Andy Forman LTYC Commodore

Beach launching protocols have been updated. Please read the new requirements below.

Masks are not required outdoors. That being said, do not loiter on the beach. (This is equivalent to the "do not loiter" protocol for the launch dock area.)

The City of Greensboro's Parks & Recreation Department has come up with a plan to allow beach launching of sail boats including multi-hulls. Here's how it works and what you need to comply with:

1. Mind the Covid Protocols at all times or we/ will lose this privilege.
2. No Masks are required outdoors. If you have not been vaccinated, you may still wish to wear a mask.
3. Mast installation and preparations **MUST BE DONE FAR AWAY FROM THE BEACH AS POSSIBLE (IF AT ALL POSSIBLE)**.
4. The paved path to the beach front is for launching and returning only. No loitering. The 10 foot beach front adjacent to the paved launch area is reserved for boats just returning. This means that, upon returning, you should immediately move your boat to that area. You must then retrieve your roller or cart from your car or move your car with trailer to that area for pickup. And as soon as possible, move your boat away from the beach area for put away. The basic ideas are the usual: • No loitering at the beach. • Minimize depth of water that you wade into. • Prep and get launched off the beach quickly. • Return and get off the beach quickly.

Amusing Sailing Terms

Boom vang (vang)

A sail control that lets one apply downward tension on the boom, countering the upward tension provided by the mainsail. The boom vang adds an element of control to mainsail shape when the mainsheet is let out enough that it no longer pulls the boom down. Boom vang tension helps control leech twist, a primary component of sail power.

Bottomry

Pledging a ship as security in a financial transaction.

Buoy

A floating object of defined shape and color, which is anchored at a given position and serves as an aid to navigation.

Bow

The front of a ship.

Bow-chaser, chase or chase-piece

A long gun with a relatively small bore, placed in the bow-port to fire directly ahead. Used especially while chasing an enemy vessel to damage its sails and rigging. (quoted from A Sea of Words).

Bowline

A type of knot, producing a strong loop of a fixed size, topologically similar to a sheet bend. Also a rope attached to the side of a sail to pull it towards the bow (for keeping the windward edge of the sail steady).

Bowse

To pull or hoist.

Bowsprit

A spar projecting from the bow used as an anchor for the forestay and other rigging.

Brail

To furl or truss a sail by pulling it in towards the mast, or the ropes used to do so.

Brass monkeys or brass monkey weather

Very cold weather, origin from the cannon balls being stored on a wheeled platform (monkey) made of brass. If the weather was so cold as to cause cannon balls to fall off the brass monkey due to different shrinkage rates of the dissimilar metals it was termed to be cold enough to freeze the balls off a brass monkey.

US Sailing takes great pride in administering and providing The Racing Rules of Sailing to members of sailing organizations. The rules provide integrity to competitive sailing and are an integral part of our sport. Sailboat racing relies on the rules to ensure that competitions are fair, consistent, and keeping sailors safe on the water.

The Racing Rules of Sailing is published every four years by World Sailing, the international authority for the sport. These rules, amended by U.S. "prescriptions," govern sailboat racing in the United States and in the portions of international races that pass through U.S. waters.

The Racing Rules of Sailing for 2021-2024 takes effect on January 1, 2021.

US Sailing has developed a NEW mobile-optimized Racing Rules App that includes the racing rules and other resources, including the ability to file a protest through the app, a whiteboard for diagramming boat-on-boat interactions, and an extensive resource library. The text of the rulebook is fully searchable and there is also a traditional index. Non-members can log into the app as a Guest and will be able to see limited content. US Sailing will continue to add more useful and innovative features to the app as they move forward.

In line with US Sailing's commitment to sustainability, the mobile app is available at no cost to all US Sailing members and is the primary distribution channel for The Racing Rules of Sailing for 2021-2024. Please note that US Sailing will not be automatically mailing copies of the printed rulebook to members in 2021. All members are entitled to purchase one printed rulebook for a flat fee of only \$7.00 and may order additional copies at the standard 25% member discount rate. The paper and waterproof versions of The Racing Rules of Sailing for 2021-2024 and the Sailor's Guide to the Racing Rules are now available for pre-order.
