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
Saturday sailing was delayed for light and changing winds, after which 2 races were held for Flying Scots and Wetas and one race was held for the Wayfarers. Sunday's wind was perfect with PRO Alan Backus setting some great courses.

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The top regional <u>Flying Scot</u> team of Dave Rink and Joel Blade (both from Lake Norman Yacht Club) dominated the Flying Scot competition with 5 bullets.

The 2nd place in the Flying Scot class went to LTYC's Robert Bouknight and Nancy Torkewitz, with 3rd place going to Dave Safirstein and Carol Claypool (also hailing from Lake Norman Yacht Club).

In the <u>Wayfarer</u> fleet, John and Mary Driver (West River Sailing Club) took 1st place with our own AnnMarie Covington and new sailor Shauna Rankin-Byrne winning 2nd place.





Alan Taylor won 1st place in the <u>Weta</u> class having been seriously challenged by new Weta sailor, Gareth Ferguson, who won 2nd place with only point separating them.

It was great to see the multi-hulls back at Lake Townsend after a couple of years of being MIA.

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Besides the awards for best scores in each one design class, the <u>Mayor's Cup</u> is awarded to the 1st place winner of the class with the highest number of boats that start in at least one race.

With that in mind, the top regional Flying Scot team of Dave Rink and Joel Blade (both from Lake Norman Yacht Club) dominated the Flying Scot competition of 13 competitors (as opposed to 8 in the Wayfarer class and 5 in the Weta class) and won the perpetual Mayor's Cup Trophy.

In addition, the <u>Bryan Cup</u> is awarded to the winner with the highest average number of boats defeated per race in its start (excluding the Mayor's Cup class). This trophy honors Joseph Bryan and the Bryan family for their generosity to the City of Greensboro.

This year, the Bryan Cup went to John and Mary Driver (West River Sailing Club) in their Wayfarer.

After over 25 years of use, the docks at Lake Townsend Marina are in desperate need of repair and maintenance. With minimal Greensboro Parks & Recreation funds available for this purpose, a Repair the Docks initiative has been established that allows private donations through the non-profit Greensboro Parks Foundation. The program is called the **Lake Townsend Docks Restoration Initiative**.

The restoration of the aging "Tee" docks at Lake Townsend Marina is essential for maintaining the quality and safety of this beloved recreational area. Your donation will be directly used to purchase the necessary repair materials, including replacement dock boards, screws, protective bumpers, and fittings.

The goals of our project are set out in four key phases:

- **Repair of Two "Tee" Docks:** Your funds will help us repair two deteriorating docks by acquiring new boards, screws, and protective bumpers. This phase is critical to ensure the docks are safe and functional for all visitors and users' boats.
- **Protective Marine Bumpers:** After the initial dock repairs, any additional funds will be directed towards installing protective bumpers at the launch ramp and on related corners and concrete columns, further enhancing safety and protecting users' boats.
- New Dinghy Dock Modules: With sufficient funding beyond the first two
 phases, we plan to purchase new plastic modules to expand the dinghy
 docks, accommodating more visitors and activities.

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• Marina Equipment and Facility Maintenance: Finally, further funds will support ongoing maintenance of the Lake Townsend Marina equipment and facilities, ensuring the longevity and utility of the marina for years to come.

Lake Townsend is a cherished resource for water supply, fishing, boating, sailing, kayaking, waterboarding, canoeing, and many other water sports. Your donation ensures that it remains a safe and enjoyable environment for all these activities. Thank you once again for your generous support. 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




How to Tie the 'Crossing-Turn' Clove Hitch

What sailing knot could you tie onto a piling for a safe and secure temporary mooring? What knot could you use to lash your rudder in place for heaving-to in stormy weather? Here's one super boating knot you'll want to know this sailing season.



I believe the clove hitch stands alone as one of the most important knots in all of sailing. And not because of robustness or strength. Indeed, a clove hitch "without assistance" will slip and slide without constant strain. And it can spill (untie) if slacked and shocked over and over.

Yet, this single knot rises to the top as one of sailings vital "foundation" knots. Many knots use the clove as a "*starter*", like the constrictor knot. Others use the clove as a "*finisher*", like the marline lashing. And, it's the perfect knot to show a novice--easy-to-learn and easy-to-tie.

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You can use the clove hitch to:

- Hold fenders in place.
- Lash a rope coil to a rail.
- Hang rope below for storage.
- Form the foundation for the double constrictor knot.
- Finish off sailing gear lashings.
- Make a temporary hitch to belay a line to a post or piling (add two half-hitches for extra security).
- Hold your tiller in place for steering (temporary).
- Adjust the tiller with ease when hove-to.

Once you know the basic clove hitch, you're ready for a bit more advanced version--and one that's even faster! Tie the Clove Hitch with a super simple *crossing-turns* technique. Follow the steps below to learn this little-known technique.

- 1. Hold a long piece of line in both hands. In illustration 1, note how the working end of the line (right side of the line) passes beneath the belayed end. If you are right handed, follow this illustration. Twist the loop of line in your right hand and place it beneath the line in your left hand (this would be belayed to a cleat or other device) If you are left handed, the working end will be in your left hand; loop this beneath the other end.
- **2.** Drape the loop over a post, piling, end of a tiller or other open-ended object as shown (illustration 2).
- **3.** Create a second crossing turn in the same exact manner as the first (illustration 3). Slide the second crossing turn up and over the first crossing turn.
- **4.** Drape the second crossing turn over the post, piling, or tiller (illustration 4).
- **5.** Take a look at illustration 4. Realize that knots often fail because they are left loose like this after the final step. Spend a few extra seconds to remove the slack and tighten up the knot. Butt up the crossing turns next to one another. Work both ends of the hitch to remove as much slack as possible (illustration 5). You could add two half-hitches or a rolling hitch beneath the knot for extra security.

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Learn how to make sailing knots faster and easier with techniques like the little-known crossing-turn clove hitch. Add this sailing tip to your "need-to-know" sailing knots list. Pass it along to your sailing crew or partner--wherever you choose to sail or cruise!
