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Great Pumpkin Race

On 12 October, LTYC held the last day of racing in this year's Saturday Series, with 6 of the 8 boats registered being Flying Scots. In a series that has been dominated by Wayfarers, it was great to see the Flying Scots turn out in such good numbers.

After the skipper's meeting, we left shore in about 4 knots of westerly breeze. The wind was forecast to remain from the west for the entire afternoon, but was expected grow to 6-8 knots as the day progressed.

The race committee set an "O" course for the first race and the first starting sequence was begun at 12:00 noon on the dot. Even though the wind stayed fairly steady (4-5.3 knots) throughout the race, it still took 62 minutes for the first finisher (Jim Heffernan/Lynn Abrams) to cross the finish line.

In order to insure that we could get 2 more races in the race committee shortened the distance to both the windward and leeward marks and called for a "W" course for the second race.

It was a good call as the wind was down to as little as 2.5 knots on the downwind leg of the second race.

The wind was back up to 5 knots so the decision was made to try to get one last windward/leeward race in for the day.

Alas, the wind gods didn't approve. Wind readings taken in the middle of the downwind leg indicated that the fleet was experiencing only 1 knot of breeze with no indication that it would get better. Indeed, the last boat across the line did so in less than a half knot of wind.



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For those who came out to Lake Townsend for the Great Pumpkin races, it was a totally fun experience.

Trish McDermott with help from Sid Hale and Sam Martin officiated on the committee boat. They were assisted by David Duff and Linda Ford manning the mark boat and Sean Brady and John Russell on the pin boat.



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
Trim Your Mainsail Faster with the Magic of a Cunningham!

What device can help you trim your mainsail faster and easier? It's not a complex system like a roller furling unit with dozens of parts. This super sail-trim tool is guaranteed to save you tons of time and effort when day sailing, racing, or cruising.



The Cunningham came from the mind of champion racing sailor Briggs Cunningham. You use the Cunningham instead of the halyard to adjust mainsail draft. It's fast and efficient.

When you use a Cunningham, you pull down on the sail instead of up on the sail, as you do with a halyard. That way, you work with gravity and this results in less friction on your mainsail's slugs or slides.

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A Cunningham consists of a sewn or hydraulic pressed ring, installed in a reinforced patch area a few inches above the tack of your mainsail (see illustration).

You attach one end of a light line to an eye-strap or strong fitting on one side of the mast near the base. Reeve (thread) the line through the Cunningham ring and cleat it off on the opposite side of the mast near the base. Larger boats or boats without a tack fitting (i.e. the J-24) may use a small purchase (block and tackle) to get sufficient tension.

Put This Time Saver into Action!

Imagine that you are out sailing on a day with a light to moderate breeze of 6 to 8 knots. Later on the breeze increases to 12 knots. As that breeze increases, your mainsail draft (deepest part of the foil) will creep aft. This can cause increased weather helm and you will lose speed to windward.

Use the halyard or Cunningham to move the draft back to a position about 45% aft of the luff. This will give you a good mainsail shape for power and speed. Now let's put two boats into play; Boat A and Boat B. Boat A has no Cunningham installed; Boat B has a Cunningham installed...

Boat A's crew will need to go forward to the mast; untie the mainsail halyard line from the cleat; insert the winch handle into the winch; grind on the winch; cleat off the halyard; remove and stow the winch handle. Nothing wrong with this action, but there are a lot of steps involved.

Boat B's crew will need to go forward to the mast; untie the Cunningham control line from the cleat; pull down on the Cunningham control line; cleat off the Cunningham control line. Fast, simple, easy--and no winches, winch handles, or grinding necessary to get the job done!

You can make the Cunningham line control even easier if you lead the control line aft to the cockpit via line organizers. You will also need to install a cleat or line clutch to belay the control line.

Try This Idea from a Master Rigger

When it comes to standing and running rigging, few people on the planet know as much as professional rigger Brion Toss (author of *The Complete Rigger's Apprentice*). Toss recommends a two-part Cunningham control line. You can also use this same arrangement as a mainsail luff reefing line. Follow these easy steps:

- 1. Measure the distance from the eye-strap on the base of the mast (described earlier) up to the mainsail Cunningham. Attach or splice a "whip" line to the eye-strap.
- 2. Make an eye splice on the other side of the "whip" line. Be sure that the eye of the splice can be passed through the Cunningham ring with an inch or two to spare on the other side.

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1. Measure the distance from the eye-strap on the base of the mast (described earlier) up to the mainsail Cunningham. Attach or splice a "whip" line to the eye-strap.

- 2. Make an eye splice on the other side of the "whip" line. Be sure that the eye of the splice can be passed through the Cunningham ring with an inch or two to spare on the other side.
- 3. Make up a small block-and-tackle with a hook on one end. Attach the lower block of the tackle to the base of the mast. Now, when you need to adjust sail draft, thread the "whip" line through the Cunningham ring, slide the hook of the tackle into the eye of the "whip" line, and haul down on your block and tackle. Use the same method for reefing the luff of your mainsail.

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Follow these fast and easy sailing tips to save time and effort aboard your small sailboat. Make sail trim a breeze and sailing more fun--wherever in the world you choose to go sailing.
