



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2024 Fall Poker Run by Ann Marie Covington

With perfect temperature, but no wind, we gathered at Lake Townsend Yacht Club on October 26, to prepare for the Poker Run Race.

The Poker Run is a sailing race around the perimeter of Lake Townsend complicated by the requirement to pick up a playing card or touch each of 6 marks during the journey. In all previous runnings of the Poker Run, I have been PRO and watched in envy as the competitors enjoyed the races. This year, Andy Forman was coerced into taking my place as PRO so that I could sail with my crew, Shauna Rankin-Byrne.

At noon, the PRO began the 3 minute sequence to start the race in very light wind. The two 420s started first. The lone Wayfarer and four Scots began the second start. The wind puffed and lulled during the race. Andy and Sean noticed that the sailors were progressing more slowly than anticipated, so they quickly drove the SCAT boat to the farthest mark and moved it closer. The race lasted exactly the recommended one hour. Competitors who stayed away from the tree lined shores tended to keep the wind in their sails more consistently.

Having a prior commitment, one of the 420s headed to shore after the first race. With only one 420 racing, the PRO decided to combine the two starts into one for the second race. The second race began with a radical wind shift at the start. It was a port tack start and straight to the first mark. The wind guickly increased in velocity and filled in all over the lake. As my crew reached out to touch the second mark, she lost her balance and fell backwards over the thwart. She lay like a turtle with her arms and legs in the air, holding on to the main sheet! She hadn't touched the mark, so we had to return. We were so busy laughing that it took a while for us to return to the mark. During that time, Tom Bews with Annette Grefe in a Scot caught up to us, passed us and touched the mark. Now we were in catch up mode. We tried and failed many times to sail better than Tom and Annette, but they remained in the lead. On a downwind leg, in light wind, with Shauna standing just behind the mast flying the spinnaker, we were sailing by the lee and one of the infamous Lake Townsend auto gybes startled me. Now Shauna was stuck between the vang and the front deck! Being the complete trooper that she is, she moved the spinnaker pole to the other side, and tried to wiggle through the vang. Failing that, she climbed through the jib sheets and walked around the front of the mast, smiling and laughing the whole time. On the final reach to the finish, we stayed high and gradually gained on Tom/Annette. In the last 20 yards we passed them and finished a boat length ahead!

Back on shore, after derigging the sailboats and putting away the SCAT boat, we gathered for pizza at the shelter. During joking and teasing and discussing sailing adventures, the poker hands were completed. The scoring, based on the finishes of the two sailing races and the ranking of the poker hand, determined that AnnMarie and Shauna earned bragging rights as the 2024 Fall Poker Run winner.

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Seamanship Under Sail Make This Three-Corner Sail Inspection

If you are anything like me, it's the little things we forget in sailing that rise like a shark to bite us in the hind parts when we forget to do the diligence. Like getting into a rush to hoist sail and get going. Here's a lesson learned from my past that could save you time and effort one day...

I sailed my Cape Dory 27 out of the anchorage and into clear water, or so I thought. It was a gusty day, and it looked like we were close to the shoal downwind. If I could hoist the working jib fast enough, I could avoid the mud flat close aboard to leeward.

So, I hauled on the halyard lickety-split, cleated the line, dashed aft to the cockpit, grabbed the tiller, turned around, and my heart dropped to stomach level. The working jib flapped like a limp noodle in the building breeze. The tack snap shackle had popped off the stemhead fitting. Now, the sail was slack from top to bottom. And we were getting closer to the flats by the minute.

So, I dashed forward again, slacked off the halyard, belayed the line, made my way forward,

and just as I got the snap shackle attached, we hit bottom. Nothing was damaged except, of course, my pride and ego. The little Bruce 2.5-pound anchors in the aft cockpit locker proved their worth that day.

I was able to cast one anchor far astern, then use the sheet winch to inch our way off the shoal. Then, I'd cast the second mini-Bruce out past the first and repeat the procedure. Soon enough, I hauled 'Winged Victory' into clear water. But, as you can see, getting in a rush stacked the dominoes against me that day. Follow the three easy steps below to help you avoid a scenario like this in the coming sailing season.

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1. Secure the Head

Most sails have three corners secured by a shackle or sheet. So, it pays to check each with care before you put it under load. In the case of a halyard shackle, make sure the pin seats into the detent (in the case of a shackle secured by a pin). Inspect the splice or knot for wear. Tie a fresh knot as needed.

2. Secure the Tack

Tack shackles are easy to forget, often hidden beneath the bulk of the hank-on jib or the bulk of the furling sail. But, as this sea story reveals, a simple check and twist to tighten the screw pin in the shackle can make a big difference. Snap shackles are popular, but they can pop open without warning. Consider taping the bale on a snap shackle with easy-to-remove rigging tape.

3. Secure the Sheets

And, of course, don't forget those sheets. In previous articles, I shared my favorite clew knot, the Lark's Head. I've never had the knot fail to do the job, and it snags less on shrouds and hatches. Most sailors prefer the bowline, but I'll take the Lark's Head any day of the week over big, bulky bowlines tied onto the clew (learn how to tie the Lark's Head in my next newsletter).

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
